Míníster's Letter



Tracing family histories seems to be a very popular hobby at the moment as people want to find out about their ancestry and I recently had a visit from a cousin of my late husband. I hadn't met up with her or her husband for quite a few years. When they arrived, they brought with them old photographs of my husband and his ancestors that I hadn't seen before.

There were photos of great grandparents and great great grandparents, uncles and aunts and cousins. I spent quite a long time looking at them whilst my husband's cousin told me who everyone was.

While I was looking at the photos I became aware of the family resemblances I could see connecting these people from the past with my own children. The same shaped noses, the same shaped heads and I even discovered that, without realising it, my husband and I had given my daughter the same names as a distant cousin that we never knew existed.

Spending time looking at those images who had formed part of my own family's past caused me to reflect on the fact that we are all part of God's family. We are told that we are made in his image and called to reflect that image by representing him in the world that he has given to us. Paul writes in Col. 1:15, that Jesus is, "the image of the invisible God" we are also told that we should be imitators of Jesus. Again in Colossians we read:

Therefore, as God's chosen people, holy and dearly loved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience.

Have you ever looked at your reflection in a mirror that has a crack across it? It becomes distorted and doesn't give a true image. Listening to news reports of what is happening across the world today, it seems

to me that some people have shattered and distorted the image that God wants them to reflect as they go about their daily lives.

The image is distorted when we hear of war and conflict, when people verbally, physically and sexually abuse others, when those in need are ignored. It is distorted when people's lives are affected by terrorism, slavery and drug and people trafficking.

Would our world change if everyone truly believed that we are created in the image of God and displayed those characteristics of compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and love? I would like to think so. Will it ever happen? Well perhaps we as God's people in this church can make a start as we each look in our own mirror and see what image is reflected back at us. As we do so let us remember the words from the book of James and not be like those ... ' who look at themselves in a mirror.... And, on going away, forget what they were like. Every blessing, *Sue*

#### Traidcraft in Crisis

Up until now I have always encouraged people to buy their fairly- traded goods where possible from the supermarkets, thus encouraging more firms to invest in Fair Trade items. However I have received the following from Traidcraft.

#### A Plea to the Churches to Act

As Traidcraft announces its 4<sup>th</sup> consecutive year of trading loss, the Chair of Traidcraft, Ram Gidoomal, has published an urgent call to action to UK churches. He says:

"despite the growth of total Fairtrade sales, we've seen Traidcraft sales decline significantly. Why?

People buy in supermarkets instead of buying from Traidcraft. Traidcraft and Fairtrade are not the same thing, and so the decline in our sales means Traidcraft's pioneering mission is **now under serious threat**."

Support us. So that, together, we can continue to make trade fairer for the world's poorest producers who still desperately need our help.

Voices from the Congregation

#### Can you tell us something about your early life?

I was born in Reading, but moved to Whitehaven (via Langholm for six months) when I was 5. I'd been to three primary schools by the time I was 6! My parents had four children and I'm the eldest. I've a sister and two brothers. They and my Dad all live in or near Whitehaven. Mum died in 2005.

#### How and when did you come to faith?

We children went to church three times on a Sunday (morning and evening service and Sunday School in the afternoon). My dad was a local preacher and very involved in church activities. My mum played the piano for the Ladies Bright Hour. All this put me off the church bit but I liked the social aspects and particularly enjoyed the Inters Club at the Methodist Church we attended. I continued going to church as I enjoyed the singing and meeting friends. When I married David we moved into a cottage in Portinscale and started attending Tithebarn Street Methodist Church. Here we met a very friendly congregation and immediately felt at home. We also joined the 18+ group at Keswick Youth Club and helped out with younger members. We took a group of youngsters on a week's holiday at a Christian centre in Norfolk and it was here I was challenged to acknowledge my faith.

#### What was your first job?

When I left the Grammar School I did a two year course in Business and Secretarial Studies at college, after which I joined an accountancy firm in Whitehaven as an audit clerk. When I moved to Keswick I worked for Broatch & Son, Solicitors (above what is now Skipton Building Society) as a secretary. I don't know how many jobs I've had over the years as I often got bored with them and moved on somewhere else!

#### Tell us something about your family

David and I have two daughters, Debbie and Jennie. Debbie was born while we lived in Keswick and spent the first nine months of her life in Blencathra Street before we moved to Edinburgh. Jennie was born while we were in Hanham, Bristol (where Roy is from!).

Debbie has two children from her first marriage – Sophie and Callum. Many of you have met them when they stay with us during the summer and at Christmas. Debbie remarried five years ago to Ian. They all now live in Abu Dhabi where Debbie works in the eye unit of an American hospital and Ian works for Etihad Airways.

Jennie is married to Russell and they live in Edinburgh with their three children – Naomi, Chloe and Isaac. Jennie works in the finance department of the head office of Penumbra, a Scottish mental health charity. Russell is starting training as a primary teacher next month.

My family is very important to me and I love spending time with them all.

# When did you first become involved with the Methodist Church at Southey Street?

David retired last August and we moved back to Keswick. We naturally gravitated towards Southey Street as the local Methodist Church, although both of us are very happy to worship ecumenically as well. We'd previously visited KMC at Convention times and when staying at the Convention Centre for our Camp Planning Weekend (see next question!).

#### What do you do in your spare time?

I'm the bookings administrator for Springs Camp, which is a three week Christian camp, run to enable people to attend Keswick Convention. I'm also a National Trust welcome volunteer at Ashness Bridge and I enjoy singing with U3A.

#### Do you have a favourite hymn?

*'My Jesus, my Saviour, Lord, there is none like you'* – because it describes the way my faith in Christ should be.

# Mystery Church Outing

Sixteen people enjoyed a mystery tour on August 5<sup>th</sup>. Some of us had attempted to work out the destination, however the only clue given was that it was 30 minutes from Keswick, so despite circles being drawn on maps I do not think that anyone guessed the destination!

We travelled alongside Bassenthwaite and through country lanes to Torpenhow, Ireby and Uldale. The weather was kind and we enjoyed views over Skiddaw and the Solway Firth. One mystery is that Torpenhow is pronounced 'Trepenna'!

Our destinations were: St Michael's and All Angels Torpenhow, Ireby Old Church, St James Church Uldale and we then went to Mae's Café for lunch.

#### St Michael's



This beautiful old village church overlooks the Solway Firth and was built in 1120. Of 98 churches built in the 12<sup>th</sup> Century only 6 remain unspoilt and this church is one of these. We wandered around the church trying to complete a guiz and also took the opportunity to look out over the Solway Firth, aware of the peaceful setting of this Norman Church possibly on the site of a Saxon building Some stone was brought from the Roman Camp of Old Carlisle and one such stone was set in the side of a window guite distinct from the others. Another stone in the sanctuary was decorated with a sunburst image and edged with a cable design. The main feature is the chancel arch

decorated with 'demon like intertwined figures' in dark red sandstone on the north side (the side of darkness) and human and animal figures in light sandstone on the south side.

The nave ceiling has painted decorations and was given to the church in 1689 by Thomas Addison. It came from London where it covered the panelled hall of one of the livery companies in the city. Thomas Addison left a sum of money to provide bread for the poor of the parish, however, they had to attend morning service on Sundays! Behind the ceiling are rough-hewn beams with an inscription "For want of pay, this work must stay".

The Norman bowl of the font rests on a 15<sup>th</sup> century shaft and behind the font, above a window, there is a medieval grave slab depicting a cross and sword, probably belonging to a knight.

There are several lovely stained glass windows mostly by Clayton and Bell.

## **Ireby Old Church**

This Norman church was built in the middle of the 12<sup>th</sup> century and the Chancel is the only part remaining, the rest being demolished in 1845/46 with the stones being used to build St James Church. Access to the church is through a field. Inside the main feature is the East wall which has three Norman windows dating from about 1170. Over the door is a tympanum dating from the late 12th century and also a medieval grave slab. Over the stone altar shelf is carved a medieval cross.

This church was built at a cost of £500 and replaced the Ireby Old Church which was considered to be too isolated. It is in fact a Norman Church from the 12<sup>th</sup> Century with extensive alterations. The interesting features include a plaque naming Thomas Tomlinson, a book containing all the epitaphs in the graveyard, a heartfelt letter from an Army Chaplain 1<sup>st</sup> World War giving news of a death, and an old photograph in the vestry.

We then travelled a short distance to Mae's Café which is in the old village school and had a lovely lunch before returning to Keswick.

## **Foodbank Update**

During the last year the North Lakes Foodbank received donations of 50 tonnes of food. Of that, nearly <sup>3</sup>/<sub>4</sub> of a tonne was donated by our church. The foodbank is feeding between 500 and 600 people per month.

People cannot just turn up and ask for food. Vouchers are given out by support agencies to people in crisis. These agencies include the Citizens Advice Bureau, Children's services, Health Visitors etc. The person receiving a voucher takes it to one of the distribution centres where they are given enough food to last for three days. There are different size packs for single people, couples or families.

The greatest need is in the towns on the west coast of Cumbria but there are also some families in Keswick who have received help from the Foodbank.

There are now 160 volunteers who work in the warehouse at Cockermouth or in the distribution centres at Cockermouth, Workington, Whitehaven, Maryport, Wigton and Egremont.

This summer the foodbank started a new scheme called 'Holiday Lunch-packs 4 Kids' During the school holidays there is extra financial pressure on families to provide meals which are normally given at school. Families whose children receive free school dinners have been given vouchers and they have been able to collect enough food to last for 5 days each week.

Each Sunday there is a list on the board by the Foodbank wheelie bin showing those items which are most needed that week but all items from the Foodbank shopping list are welcome.

A big thank you to everyone who brings in a donation of food to our church every week.
