## Minister's Letter



I have been very conscious as I have been driving around the area recently and indeed by merely looking through the window, that things are growing rapidly. Spring may finally be on its way! There are signs of new growth everywhere.

Growth is something we should encourage in others and seek for ourselves. Creating the conditions for the growth of our faith in our Church life is as essential as creating the right conditions for plants to flourish. The season of Lent is one that often provides additional opportunities for such growth when there are Lent groups available and many people try to find time to read a book that will help their faith to deepen. It is also a time when we can reflect on our own personal journeys and perhaps ask the question, "Am I further along the road than I was?" Alternatively we might simply ask if we feel we have grown in our faith.

I also reflect though, that there are often things growing in the garden that we do not wish to see growing there, or that plants can run riot, stunting the growth of other things or actually growing to the point where they need pruning in order to do better. There are obvious comparisons with our lives! So another question we might ask in Lent is whether or not there are things that are wrong in our lives which need rooting out and eradicating.

Jesus gives us the chance and our lives will produce better fruit if, with his help, we can get rid of those things. We know ourselves how we think we have got rid of weeds at times only for them to appear again no matter how many different weed killers we use! Again, let us use the opportunity during these days of Lent so that fresh good growth may be seen as the days grow longer and we are more in the light.

Many people grew in faith after coming under the influence of Jesus in the Bible and many have done so, since he made that journey into Jerusalem, had a last supper with his friends, was betrayed in a garden, faced trials and crucifixion and then rose again on the third day; and he continues to provide opportunities for all people to grow, for he came saying, "I am come that you might have life and have it in all its fullness!"

As the diocese faces up to the ever increasing costs of providing clergy, the next vicar will also take responsibility for the Borrowdale Valley and will too play a leading part in the setting up of the Keswick Mission Community which will draw Anglicans and Methodists closer together in organisation and outreach within the town and surrounding villages.

The latest news is that funding the redevelopment work is going to cost about £503,020, and we've already identified £236,000 (which includes the Circuit grant) that's currently available to us. So that leaves only £267,020 to find!! We're nearly half way there.

The £267,020 will be raised through our own fund raising efforts and grant applications. The fundraising group have been beavering away in the background and, hopefully, you've attended some of the events which have been arranged. There are three major funders which we'll be targeting: the Methodist Church at a national level, the Joseph Rank Trust and the Garfield Weston Trust. Richard North has been working hard liaising with our treasurer, the District Property Secretary, our architect, various connexional people and grant givers to build up our business plan and to prepare the way for grant applications. Our first major application is to the Methodist Church and is due in by 2 March. We appreciate the support and encouragement we have received from District Officers, churches whose members have visited us and heard of our plans, Circuits in the District and individuals.

You should all have received an appeal letter in January asking you to offer your gifts to Vision 21 and the ongoing life of the church. God has placed us all in this church as our Christian home and so we each have a responsibility to God to be involved in church life. Thank you to those of you who've responded and offered your gifts. We look forward to receiving the rest in the very near future. Your commitments and our working together says to funders that we are a church that wishes to go places in our service of God. If you haven't yet returned your gifts form to me please do so urgently.

Once these are in it will make it easier for the fundraising committee to know who to approach for what help. Your help will be needed as there is a lot to happen:

# *Voices from the Congregation*

**Helen North**



## **1. Can you tell us something about your early life?**

I was born on the 24<sup>th</sup> Feb 1965 in Bishop Auckland, Co. Durham. My Dad was an English teacher and my Mam stayed at home to look after me and my brother. I had a very happy childhood and enjoyed school. My life revolved around church and music and I began piano lessons when I was 7 and clarinet lessons when I was 11. Most school holidays were spent going away with the caravan to all sorts of places, but predominantly Scotland and the Lake District. In 1983 I went to Nottingham University to study Pharmacy and that's where I met Richard.

## **2. How and when did you come to faith?**

I was born into a Methodist family and attended church at Central Methodist Church, Bishop Auckland from as early as I can remember. I belonged to a large Sunday School and went to the Girls Club and Youth Club. My Nanna was a very good singer and sang in the church choir, my Dad was organist and my Mam was a Sunday School teacher.

At university, Methsoc (where I met Richard) became a huge part of my life and my membership service was held at Chilwell Road Methodist Church where we went as students. It was during this time that my faith really developed under the expert guidance of Rev John Cooke, our Methodist University Chaplain.

In Worcester, where we lived after getting married, we belonged to St Andrew's Methodist Church which filled my life for the next 27 years. It was a wonderful fellowship that I experienced there and we were blessed in having an exceptional and gifted minister who was a real inspiration to me.

At St. Andrew's I accompanied the choir, led the Music Group and was a church steward for a number of years, (among other things!), eventually becoming Senior Steward (a demanding role there, which you normally only did for 6 months, although I did it for a year). This really deepened my faith and was probably the most fulfilling year of my life. I really felt that God was by my side guiding and caring for me during that time.

### **3. What was your first job?**

My first job was working as an assistant in Darlington library in the summer holidays while I was still at school. While studying for my pharmacy degree I worked at Boots the Chemist in Bishop Auckland during the holidays and did my pre-registration year at Newton Aycliffe which meant a move back to live with my parents. My first job after qualifying in 1987, was as a relief pharmacist in Worcestershire and South Birmingham area (the 'Birmingham A to Z' came in very handy!) When the children came along, I worked at Hereford on a Saturday and then Droitwich. I've just realised that I've now worked for Boots for over 30 years!

### **4. Tell us something about your family**

Richard and I married in August 1987, and after a very short honeymoon in Keswick, moved to Worcester to begin our new jobs. I have quite a small family who all live in Bishop Auckland, and my parents thankfully still remain quite fit. I have a younger brother, Alistair who still lives with them. Our son Matthew (24) lives with us and works at the Cumberland Building Society in Keswick and our daughter Lucy (21) is in her final year at Nottingham University (a very good choice!) studying music.

### **5. When did you first become involved with the Methodist Church at Southey Street?**

It was an important part of our move to the Lakes that we found and belonged to a welcoming church, and there was no doubt after walking into Southey Street in January 2014, and being met with a very friendly welcome, that this would be our new church.



## **6. Do you have any particular likes or dislikes?**

Likes: being on top of a mountain, Herdwick sheep, eating (normally too much!), 'organisation out of chaos' (Richard keeps telling me that there must be a new career opportunity there for me!), music and relaxing at home with my family

Dislikes: pomposity, disorganisation & untidiness, flying, nuts, and rain (I'm in the right place then!)

## **7. What do you do in your spare time?**

I play the piano (although not half as much as I used to) and sing with the Keswick Choral Society. I also enjoy listening to classical music when I can. However, fell walking is what I enjoy the most and I'm at my happiest when I'm walking on the tops. Having completed the Wainwrights last summer, another challenge was needed, so in May, Richard and I are doing the 'Coast to Coast' walk (help!) so I try to go out walking as much as possible.

## **8. Do you have a favourite hymn?**

This is a difficult question as I like many hymns and worship songs, but my overall favourite is 'O thou who camest from above' for two reasons. Firstly, the tune 'Hereford' is one of the best in the hymnbook (a beautiful tune which fits the words perfectly), and secondly for the poetic and prayerful words of Charles Wesley. The hymn makes clear that faith is the gift of Christ. It acknowledges our absolute need for God's Holy Spirit, burning like a flame deep within us, guiding and inspiring us and keeping our calling alive and active. These words have inspired me throughout my life.

## **9. What are your hopes for the future?**

I hope that our children will eventually find their way in life and will be happy, that all Christians will be united and speak with one voice, and that love will overcome hatred and the world will be at peace.

It's great to see everyone pulling together to help their neighbours in crisis in West Cumbria.



We have seen over the last year many, many families helped by the work of the Foodbank, together with the fantastic agencies that work with us to serve the people. 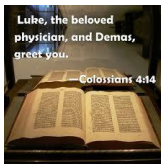


I'm excited, I'm hopeful of another incredible year, not for anything I do, but for all you do for us. Thank you.

# COP21 Climate Change Summit - Statement

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16 December 2015

**The Methodist Church in Britain have released a statement regarding the recent agreements made at the COP21 climate change summit in Paris which concluded on Saturday.**

Nearly 200 nations were involved in the negotiations to limit the rise in global temperatures to less than 2C. The agreement is partly legally binding and partly voluntary.

Key points -

- Keep global temperature increases "well below" 2C (3.6F) with a goal of 1.5C.
- Peak greenhouse gas emissions as soon as possible and achieve a balance between sources and sinks of greenhouse gases in the second half of this century.
- Review the progress every five years.
- Provide \$100 billion a year to developing countries by 2020 to assist them in reducing greenhouses gases.

President of the Methodist Conference, the Revd Steve Wild, commented:

"We are delighted with the historic achievement at the climate summit in Paris. Our Lord's call to us to be disciples is often challenging. When God

entrusted his creation to our care he never said that it would be easy. In our churches we recommit ourselves to tread more lightly on the earth. We pray that we can work together for the common good remembering that we are called to be reconciled to God and to one another in love."

Vice President of the Methodist Conference, Dr Jill Barber, commented:

"In the past few years the government's implementation of a feed-in tariff for solar panels has led to the installation of at least 70 solar panel systems on Methodist churches as well as the District manse in which I live! This demonstrates how sensible public policy can inspire individual and community action. Yet the government now proposes to cancel a scheme that has been successful in unlocking capital and engaging commitment on the part of householders and local community groups. The agreement in Paris suggests that we need more collaboration between Government, individuals and communities around climate change, not less."

Steve Hucklesby, Policy Adviser for the Joint Public Issues Team and specialist on climate change, commented:

"In the light of the achievement in Paris the UK Government's proposed cuts to incentives for investment in renewables need to be reconsidered. We cannot simply replace the burning of coal with gas. In the past our Churches called for 60% of our electricity to be generated from renewable energy by 2030. We need leadership from our government so that we can all see more clearly the path that our nation must take to a low carbon future.
