Minister's Letter



I'm sure that some of you know the story about Jesus ascending to heaven and being greeted by the angels who asked him how successful his mission had been on earth. He explained to them that he had left behind a small group of disciples to whom he had committed the ongoing work of bringing in the Kingdom of God which he had inaugurated.

They weren't very impressed. "That lot?" one of them said. "Why, they've proved to be pretty unreliable! Surely you have another plan if, and when, they fail, which is extremely likely?" Jesus replied, "I have no other plan".

May 5 is Ascension Day, and ten days later we will celebrate the Day of Pentecost. The first recalls Jesus leaving the disciples and the second the equipping of that group of the first followers of Jesus to "get on with it". It's as though Jesus says, in effect, "It's over to you"

How confident are we in accepting what Jesus asks of us? That now it is over to us and we are to get on with it. What hope have we to continue the mission of God here on earth? We are all aware of our shortcomings, whether in knowledge, experience, expertise, self-confidence, strength, energy and all the rest.

Paul writes to the immature church in Corinth, "By one Spirit we have all been baptized into one Body and we have all been made to drink of the one Spirit". This is all about strength in our weakness and power in our powerlessness. It seems to me that, what God seems to look for in us is not strength but weakness, not self-confidence but total and utter dependence on him.

We are all part of the body of Christ and we depend on him to give us the strength we need to carry on his mission. As we continue to work and fundraise for the redevelopment project we must also not lose sight of the continuing mission of God in this church. We need the

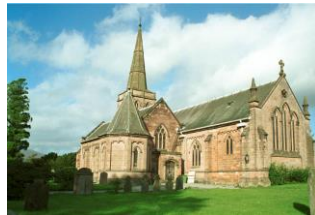
community to see that we care for them, we welcome them and want to meet their needs in whatever way we can.

You feel this situation doesn't fit well, or is something you never imagined you would do! Of course, looking back now I can see how God used that uncomfortable time to mould me, to equip me and to bring about His purpose.

Sometimes God's methods are not always pleasant. They might even feel dark and lonely at times. There have been times I desperately wanted to see a light on my dark path, but instead God simply offered me His hand to hold in the darkness. I have begun to understand that this is worth much more because it taught me to trust Him to lead me in the right direction.

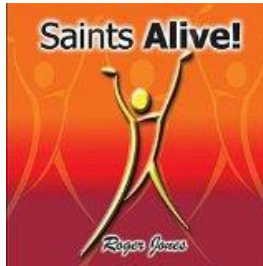
This is how I ended up amongst you all in Keswick! And of course, this is how my candidating has progressed- with a lot of support from God and people in the circuit.

Meet our neighbour Morsheda



Morsheda is a young mother of four living in Bangladesh. She has no land, few assets and no savings. For Morsheda's family living on low-lying islands in the Brahmaputra River, floods are a terrifying part of everyday life. Morsheda can't even count on having a safe place to call home: the single-room, corrugated-iron house she shares with her children has been flooded four times.

'I feel very scared of the river. When I look at it I keep thinking "it is coming".'

Dangers all around

One year, her humble house filled up to her knees with floodwater. To stay dry, and keep away from the dangerous snakes that now swam through her home she raised her bed up on bricks. But during the night she was woken by a loud splash. In the pitch black, her baby son had fallen into the inky water. He could have drowned in moments.

Race against time

In a bad year, huge waves crashed against her house, giving her less than an hour to uproot her home and scramble to safety. Racing against time, she gathered her terrified children together and hastily made a raft from a banana tree.

At any moment, it could have tipped and plunged them into the swirling waters, but it was their only hope. She put her youngest daughter in a cooking pot and clung to it as it floated in the current.

'My children were so scared. My sister was holding them very tightly and we were panicking because my neighbour's child was washed away.'

The floods are coming

Morsheda and her children live a precarious life. They know that the floods will come again, and soon. But we can lift our neighbours like Morsheda to safety. Just £250 is enough for a Christian Aid Home Safety Package. It could flood-proof Morsheda's home, raising it eight feet on an earth plinth, so that she has a safe place to rebuild, keep livestock and grow crops. It could also buy a goat, seeds and a wormery to help produce compost – all of which will give her a long-term income and a solid foundation for a new life.

'If I could raise my house then I would feel much safer living here with my children.'

Whether you hold a church collection or collect house-to-house, your actions this Christian Aid Week could change the life of our global neighbours like Morsheda. Join us in the week we love every neighbour.

Voices from the Congregation

Joyce Ellis



Can you tell us something about your early life?

I was born in Birmingham on Bonfire Night 1944 the youngest of three children. My brother, Peter, is 5 years older than me and my sister, Pat, 18 months older. All my family came from Birmingham but when I was two my father got a job at the gas works in St Helens and we moved to Huyton in Liverpool, which was then a village. At the age of six we moved again with my father's work, this time to Nottingham where I grew up and went to school and where I call home. My sister and stepmother still live there.

How and when did you come to faith?

I was brought up in a Methodist home and the family were very involved in the local Methodist church at Beeston, my father being the Sunday School secretary and steward and my mother being the JMA secretary and pianist for the Sisterhood. I attended Sunday School regularly and remember Sunday School Anniversaries with fond memories as being one of the highlights of the year, when we all 'sat up' on the erected platform. As a church the singing was always good and I particularly remember being moved by the singing of one evening worship when a full church (including the gallery) sang *The day thou gavest*.

I shall for ever be grateful for all the grounding in the Bible stories I received doing the annual scripture exams of the National Sunday School Union. All of this shaped my faith which came to fruition at the Easter-time when I was about 13, when I was reached by the Easter story in a way I had not known before, and gave my life to Jesus Christ. By the time I went to university in London I knew I wanted to work as a missionary teacher in Africa.

Whilst still at the church I was further blessed by being in a place with a youth group who argued about everything including the faith. Not only did this give me the ability to work out my faith with honesty but I knew early on that it was alright to question anything and everything. It is an openness which I still have and appreciate, which holds me in good stead!

What happened next?

I went to university at Kings College, London to study Maths and Physics. Whilst there I met Roy and we married when we graduated in July 1966. We both wanted to teach in Africa and so we spent our first year of married life

doing our teaching diploma at the Institute of Education in London in the department for Education in Tropical areas.

What was your first job?

We went to Zambia where we taught in one of the government schools in the newly independent country. We had a wonderful three and a half years there – certainly learning as much as we taught and coming away with a perspective on life that has stayed with us ever since. I taught Maths whilst Roy taught Science.

Tell us something about your family

Our daughter, Julie was born in Zambia and our son Marc a few months after our return to the UK. We went to live in south-east London where Roy taught in a local comprehensive. I was at home with the children, but when they were old enough to go the playgroup and nursery, Roy's head teacher discovered he had a maths teacher at home. This was a time of severe teacher shortage and the head said I could write my own timetable and there would be places for the children at the local nursery class of the infants school. As I always loved my teaching this proved an ideal situation.

Julie is now married to Andrew who is a Methodist minister in Gloucester and Julie is a Church and Community Worker, appointed by their circuit and attached to one of Andrew's churches. Marc is married to Emma and lives at Horsham with Amy aged 5 and Ben coming up to 3. Many of you will remember Ben being born here on the same day as Prince George and making the front page of the Keswick Reminder! Children and grandchildren remain a constant delight.

My call to the Ministry

In my mid thirties I began to experience anxiety attacks that at times meant I could not carry on what I was doing. They did not seem to relate to anything I could identify and they seemed totally out of character. I was very confused, not only mentally but spiritually, as I had always seen myself as both a confident and optimistic person, which I put down to my faith.

With the encouragement of my minister I went for counselling with the Westminster Pastoral Foundation, which had been set up in London by a Methodist Minister. This was around 1980 and Counselling was very new, certainly I did not know of it. It turned out to be one of the most transforming experiences of my life. Not only did it begin to get me in touch with the root causes of my anxiety (starting with the fact that I had never really mourned my mother's death when I was 18), but the deeper and more complicated things too.

I began to see how many of the doctrines of the Christian faith, which I knew academically from my training as a local preacher, were in fact the basics of understanding our human behaviour and the place of healing. I began to understand in a new way what it meant that God accepts us as we are, (at a point in my counselling when I was not able to do so). One turning point came when I was reading a book that said, amongst other things, that when disturbing things start happening in our lives it may be God, 'in his wrath' not allowing us to be half the people he intended us to be. Suddenly, what was happening to me, was not some inconvenience I needed to deal with to get on with my life, but God intervening to 'redeem me'. It was part of my salvation.

I also learnt in my counselling that I need to learn to 'be' as well as to 'do'. A whole new world of meditation and quietness opened up before me, which I am still learning to pursue and appreciate. I also learnt subsequently that although my anxiety episodes were mostly under control they would never totally go away, and I still experience them occasionally. After I had completed my own counselling I then felt I wanted to learn more and went back to the WPF for counsellor training.

A little while later I felt a call to ministry, which grew over time until I offered for the ministry, candidated and was accepted for training. I started in circuit in Maidstone, Kent in 1986. I felt it significant that God did not call me to ministry until after these experiences. I was aware that what I brought to ministry was not just the 'capable' Joyce, but the 'vulnerable' Joyce I had discovered within. I discovered that this was the side people were more easily able to relate to in times of difficulty. After 20 years of teaching I then went on to nearly 20 years in the full time ministry, serving next in Wallington in south west London and then finally in Somerset. A joy, a privilege and a blessing. Though not without a few bumps on the way!

When did you first become involved here at Southey Street?

We have been coming to Keswick for our holidays since the mid seventies and later, on moving into a manse, we bought a house here, continuing to visit whenever we could. We attended either Tythebarn St or Southey St on our visits, and indeed I had 2 sabbaticals in Keswick. On retirement eleven years ago we became members here.

Do you have any particular likes or dislikes?

I have been involved with feminist theology from its early days when I was training. I passionately see it as part of our redemption (for men as well as women). I enjoy wildlife and my wildlife garden, reading and classical music, and walking the fells. My favourite hymn is *O thou who camest from above*

What are your hopes for the future?

A just and peaceful world, at peace with itself and God.

Just a note to say thanks very much for the support we have received for The DaySpring Trust, all seems to be well over there.

The children who used to live at Sinai Orphanage are now supported financially by the charity and attend the homework club daily after school. They are full of life and seem healthy and happy in their new situations, mostly with extended family members. We feel it's been a good transition for them and are pleased with their progress so far.

The children who attend Sinai Primary School and Nursery are currently working towards their final exams of the year. In Tamil Nadu the hottest month of the year is May, so their school summer holidays will begin from April 22nd. There is ongoing repair work being done on the school building which was hit particularly badly by the flooding at the end of last year.

At the Tailoring school one class of ladies has just finished their year-long course and we are preparing to welcome a new class to begin. It's always very satisfying to see a group of ladies prepared and ready to go out and begin a new job/life after their training with us.

A letter from Jessie at the Foodbank :



Demonstrating the Christian values

Dear All

You will, I am sure, have seen in the press today (15 Apr) that the Trussell Trust have released the year end figures. Our Foodbank centres statistics are part of these figures. You may be wondering how we fit into this bigger picture and I wanted to share this with you, as you are very much part of this picture.

Putting to one side all the politics around the need for Foodbanks, please remember that people in our community need our help and your hard work enables us to be able provide this sustainable community support.

Our year end position:

Over the last year we have had a 4% rise in the amount of food parcels we have given out – 5672 food parcels, around 56000 meals.

- The Trussell Trust has given out 110 million parcels, a 2% rise.
- The NW as a whole has had a 2% rise.
- Barrow has had a 18% decline.
- We have had 60 tonnes of food donated to us which included the Kids pack food. Between 230 and 240 families have registered with us to receive Kids lunch packs over the holiday period. We have consistently had around a 60% take up of this registered figure.

Quote from David McAuley CEO Trussell Trust

““One million three day food supplies given out by our foodbanks every year is one million too many. This must not become the new normal,” says CEO.

The latest Trussell Trust figures released today reveals that foodbank use remains at record levels, whilst new research from the University of Hull gives a fresh insight into UK hunger by mapping foodbank data against census data.
