Minister's Letter



I had a week away in Derbyshire recently, part of it spent with friends and family at the Cliff College Festival enjoying some inspiring bible studies, and preaching and catching up on news.

Following the festival myself and 2 friends remained in Derbyshire touring the area. One of the places we visited was the Heights of Abraham at Matlock Bath. As some of you may know, to get to the Heights of Abraham you either walk up a very steep and long pathway or use the cable car – we chose the cable car!



As we travelled up, the view from the cable car was magnificent, you could see for miles looking out across the

countryside but you could also look down on what was happening on the ground below, people going about their daily business and getting on with their lives oblivious to the fact that they were being watched from up above.

Reflecting on my trip in the cable car and what I could see, caused me to think about how important it is that we sometimes step back and look at what is going on around us and in our personal lives from above (metaphorically speaking of course!) We need to give ourselves time to think about decisions we need to make without being influenced by others. We need to look at the bigger picture to see what is going on.

We live in a world that is increasingly in turmoil. Pressure can come upon us in the family, in marriage relationships, in friendships, in the work place, and even in the church, and from other Christians individually. The world itself is in constant threat of wanting to "self-destruct" because of the hatred (and often it is religious hatred) that abounds. For those of us seeking to trust God and his direction, it is very important that we continually are encouraged to keep our focus and mind on "the bigger picture."

It is so easy to be influenced by the problem at hand, that nasty piece of criticism, or that well-meaning Christian who cannot see the real desire and motivation of why we want to go down a particular route. If we focus in on the immediate, or that one particular problem, we are likely to become engulfed with a mentality that will eventually make us give up and prevent us from fulfilling the vision which God has given to us.

When we see the bigger picture we need to be realistic enough to know that if we are going to accomplish great things, then we are going to encounter obstacles. These things can affect us in one of two ways. We can either allow them to impact us in a negative way, or we can learn from them and spur us on to even greater things. When the negatives come we need to recognise that it is God's call and vision we are pursuing, then we can see negative things can to be turned into "stepping stones" rather the bigger picture and those present, temporal, and even than "stumbling blocks".

Romans 8. 28 - 31 states:

"We know that all things work together for good to those who love God, to those who are called according to His purpose . . . What then shall we say to these things? If God is for us, who can be against us?"

To know the reality of these verses, we have to be seeing the bigger picture as we move forward in the vision we have for our church here in Keswick

Keswick Methodist Church Redevelopment and Fundraising

We've recently had a busy few weeks fundraising! On Saturday 21 May 7pm **Penrith Methodist Church Choral Group** performed in our church before a small, but appreciative, audience. This event raised £130 after expenses were taken out.

Then on Saturday 11 June 10am–4pm was our first **Table Top Sale** and part of a very busy day. Refreshments were available all day with the addition of soup at lunchtime. Although few tables were booked by people outside the church we raised £243. In the evening **The Dalesmen Singers** Male Voice Choir sang from 8pm, bringing us a varied programme which the larger audience appreciated. After expenses a total of £447.50 was raised to be split between the Keswick Lions/Rotary Flood Relief Fund (£223.75) and our Vision 21 Project (£223.75).

We'd like to thank all those who gave of their time to organise the arrangements and to bake beforehand and those who were there on the day. Those who helped enjoyed meeting people and working together. Perhaps you'd like to join us to help at our next event – there's room for more!

Our next two exciting events are during the Convention and immediately after. Both events require input from us all. Voices from the Congregation

Kim Moses



Can you tell us something about your early life?

I was born and raised in Lancaster and spent all of my very happy childhood there with my mum, dad and sisters. I am the third of four girls. My dad wasn't yet a Christian when I was young but I remember mum always taking me and my sisters to church. I remember that she made all four of us wear matching dresses and pigtails for church and I hated it because I would much rather wear boy's clothes- which I did the rest of the week! Mum was a local preacher in the Methodist church for many years, and church was always a large part of my life.

How and when did you come to faith?

It's very tricky for me to answer this question because I genuinely can't remember a time when I have ever doubted that God was real and that he loved me, even when I went through hard times as a kid. Although I have always had a faith of some kind, there have been times where I have changed the way I think about certain things or begun to understand things better, those are the big changes I can remember.

What was your first job?

My first job was when I was 16 years old, in a local shop called "Double Two" which rented out video's and DVD's. I remember I earned £25 pounds a week because I used to put £2.50 into the church collection every week and I felt very proud of myself!

Tell us something about your family

My husband is Moses (who you already know!) and we have three children; Joshua (7), Jessica (5) and Jonah (3) who are very lovely and very noisy! Moses and I are both still very close to our extended families in England and in India, and we catch up with them all as much as possible.

How has your faith developed?

As I grew up in the church and began to attend church youth club, my leader really encouraged us all to seek to discover our own gifts or calling. I don't remember how exactly it happened but when I was about 12 years old I was asked to give a 'mini sermon' at one of the youth services that we did for the church. From that time I was always asked to do that job, mostly because other people were generally pleased to not have to do it, I think! Through these services, and also through my own study at home, I realised how much I loved God's Word. I also found that the more that I explored and understood, the more I felt closer to the Lord and felt like I got to know Him better; this intense exploration of the Bible helped my faith to develop and grow like no other time before (or probably since!) I don't remember the thought ever occurring to me, I just remember always wanting to go to a bible college of some sort and continue to learn more about God. I did RE at A Level and then, as soon as school finished, I applied for places at several bible colleges. I liked the feel of Cliff College in Derbyshire best and was accepted straight away, so I ended up there at the age of 18. I began in the September and Moses (who was then in his 4th year studying for an MA) decided (yes, decided!) we were an official 'couple' in the November! And the rest is history!

When did you first become involved with the Methodist Church at Southey Street?

I first became involved at Southey Street in September 2014 when Moses started working as the Circuit Church and Family Worker. We have just found out that he has been accepted to train part-time as a student presbyter and that the circuit are happy to keep him working here part-time- so it looks like you're all stuck with us for the next three years!

Do you have any particular likes or dislikes?

I like reading, I like painting and drawing, I like to sing, and I like to write. But to be honest, I have very little time for these things at the moment because life is busy and the kids are young! I dislike scary films and ironing!

What do you do in your spare time?

If the kids are off school, we go to the park, ride bikes, draw or build Lego. If Moses and I have a free evening we usually sit and watch a film together, or if Moses is out I would probably read a book. Maybe that sounds a bit ordinary, but it's lovely doing things like that when you've got three busy children around most of the time, they feel like really precious moments!

Do you have a favourite hymn?

I love 'And can it be' by Charles Wesley because the words still amaze me every time I sing it. I also love 'Because he lives' by Bill and Gloria Gaither, which I chose for my baptism when I was 17, just because I didn't know what my future would bring, but I trusted the Lord. Then it became even more special to us when we were in hospital with Josh a few years later. Especially verse two and the chorus which say

"How sweet to hold a new-born baby, and feel the pride and joy he brings.
But sweeter still the calm assurance, this child can face uncertain days because He lives.
Because He lives I can face tomorrow, because He lives all fear is gone, because I know He holds the future, and life is worth the living just because He lives."

What are your hopes for the future?

I hope that my children will come to know the Lord, to really know Him and to want to follow Him, in whatever way is right for them. I also hope that Moses and I will be used by God in the future, to bless people and to show them how much God cares for them.

The Knitted Bible has been travelling the UK since 2008! Hartlepool URC started knitting at the end of February 2008 and only intended to create the scene of The Last Supper, but enthusiasm and imagination combined to make them more ambitious! Their hope is that in depicting some of the best-known stories in the Bible, everyone who sees them will be able to understand and enjoy them – and may discover some detail that they had forgotten or never noticed before – whilst learning more about God and his love for this world and its people.

We've been fortunate to book the exhibition for Vision 21 at Keswick Methodist Church early in August. The church will be home to 33 different stories from the Bible, brought to life through three-dimensional knitted figures and models.

Our church continues to give good support to the Foodbank. Some people bring an item or a few items of food every week and others have given money to the foodbank. This is useful as the Foodbank can then go and buy any particular items which they are short of.

The Foodbank is still feeding about 500 people a month. At the end of July they will also start their 'Holiday Lunchpacks 4 Kids' programme. Families whose children get free school meals are given vouchers by the school. They bring those vouchers to the Foodbank each week and collect enough food to feed the kids during the six weeks of the summer holidays.

The Foodbank has just appointed (with funding from a charity) a part time Schools Worker who will go into schools to tell children about the work of the Foodbank.
