## Minister's Letter



I don't know how many of you have ever watched the Vicar of Dibley? I find it very amusing and can often relate to some of the experiences that Geraldine the vicar has in the series - quite often the idea of having a cassock with pockets full of chocolate seems very appealing!

One of the episodes finds Geraldine strolling along a track and decides to jump in the puddles ahead of her on the pathway. However the puddle she chooses to jump in is deeper than she thinks and she ends up disappearing from view under the water only to reappear coughing and spluttering! Geraldine should have looked more closely at the puddle before she blindly jumped in without knowing the consequences of her actions.



By the time you are reading this letter we will be at the beginning of the season of Lent for this year. The time when many of us will be deciding what, if anything, we may want to do to mark this time when we remember Jesus fasting and praying in the wilderness.

People often decide to give up something that they like - possibly chocolate - as a way of showing self - control. Some people decide to take something else on during this period - attending a bible study, spending

more time in prayer, helping someone in need or going that extra mile for someone.

The problem is that whatever we decide to do we need to think about why we are doing it.

So “look before you leap” this Lent when deciding what you can and possibly should give up, or take on at this time of year and ask yourself the question if it truly is something that brings you closer to God, on the run up to the celebration of Easter. Or are you going to get out of your depth?

It is important however to note that Easter Day cannot make any real sense without the events of Maundy Thursday and Good Friday.

On **Maundy Thursday** evening, at 7pm we will gather in church for a Tenebrae service with communion and be reminded of Jesus’ commandment to love one another and the darkness that followed.

On **Good Friday** there will be a short service at 10am followed by the March of Witness through the town at 11am

Then on **Easter Sunday** the great celebration of Jesus’ resurrection.

The baptism of Poppy Grace Johnson Daughter of Sharon and Paul Johnson will take place on Sunday March 26th.



**Secretary** – **Sheila Files** – convene meetings of Church Friends twice a year & report to Leadership Team and Church Council.

At Keswick Methodist Church, we consider ourselves to be a community of friends. Although this is the case, every church member and regular attendee has been allocated a special **Church Friend**. The **Church Friends** have a particular responsibility towards those they are a friend to, ensuring that everyone is supported and cared for. Just twice a year we will have a “get together” of **Church Friends**, to make sure that things are running smoothly.

**Church Friends**, and those they are friends to, should decide between them what sort of contact they wish to have. It can be as much or as little as they wish. As well as seeing each other at Church, the following have been suggested:

- a) An occasional visit at home

- b) An occasional phone call
- c) To know that they are praying for you weekly
- d) To meet up sometimes
- e) Anything else you both agree on

We start with a great piece of news! We heard in the middle of January that the Joseph Rank Foundation have awarded us a grant of £35,000. This takes us to within £50,000 of our target. God is good! And in the next few weeks we'll have the results of the planning application for the toilet extension.

While we continue with our fundraising and grant applications, meetings of the redevelopment group with the architect have stepped up to every month. There are lots of details to be worked out and here are some of them: the heating system and its operation, lighting, sound and vision systems, type of partition between the two spaces, colour scheme, furniture, chairs (church and general use) and storage.

Storage in particular is going to exercise our minds. Where will our cleaning materials go? Or the safe, photocopier and paper? How about 300 chairs? Our Fairtrade stock? Some members of the group are visiting other recently redeveloped churches to get ideas.

**Women's World  
Day of Prayer**

This year the service has been prepared by the women of the Philippines. The theme is

*Am I being fair to you ?*

**Friday 3<sup>rd</sup> March at 10.30am**  
**Quaker Meeting House** (opposite Booths)

On Friday 3 March over 5,000 services will be held in the British Isles on the theme of Am I Being Unfair to You? The Christian women of the Philippines wrote the service and it has been translated into 1,000 different languages and dialects, to be used, throughout the whole world, on Friday 3 March, starting at sunrise over the island of Samoa and continuing until sunset off the coast of American Samoa.

In 2013, Typhoon Haiyan – named locally as ‘Yolanda’ – struck the Philippine islands in the western Pacific ocean. This is mentioned in the service but you will also hear the stories of a girl, a mother and an older woman, recounting their situations and their hopes and fears. The service focusses on the Bible story of the workers in the vineyard: Matthew 20 v 1 – 16. There is a reflection on the artwork designed by

Rowena 'Apol' Laxamana-Sta.Rosa. It is thought-provoking and illustrates contrasting scenes.

The Day of Prayer is not just for women – everyone is welcome to attend the service on 3 March. For further information and resources, please visit the Women's World Day of Prayer website at [www.wwdp.org.uk](http://www.wwdp.org.uk).

Over 36 hours, 170 countries will have taken part. In England, Wales and Northern Ireland over 5000 services will be held.

## *Voices from the Congregation*

### **1. Can you tell us something about your early life?**

I was born and brought up in Beeston, Leeds and moved to Roundhay when Chris and I got married in 1982. Many of our weekends and holidays were spent walking and camping in the Yorkshire Dales or on the east coast - Whitby and Hunmanby are particular favourites.

### **2. How and when did you come to faith?**

We have had a productive few months at CRAG with the move from Edward Street to the new premises at St. Nicholas St. We are still sorting clothes and other items every couple of weeks so do get in touch if you think you can help out with this or other jobs. The next trip to France will be taking place in February, bringing supplies to Paris and to some of the new camps that have sprung up in Northern France since the closure of The Jungle.

Work at the [Dunkirk Adult Learning Centre](#) continues to go well and we are supporting the rebuild of the Women and Children's Centre at the Dunkirk camp.

We have launched our Twitter page @CarlisleCRAG so please follow us if you're on Twitter and retweet our posts! We are about to launch #CarlisleWelcomesRefugees along with our new website so watch this space!

In recent weeks we have made cash donations to three worthwhile projects supporting refugees on the continent of Europe:  
The [Refugees in Paris Winter Appeal](#) supports a group of volunteers providing food and shelter to people on the streets  
The [Dirty Girls of Lesvos appeal](#) washes and recycles blankets and other shelter items on the Greek Island of Lesvos and nearby islands.  
The [Phone Credit for Refugees](#) project provides the lifeline of contact with family and friends to refugees stranded around Europe.

We encourage you to support these appeals or please continue to [donate to CRAG](#) and we will ensure that your money is used wisely.

Looking ahead to 2017 we are working with Cumbria County Council and other partners on how we can support the Syrian refugee families when they arrive in April. We have organised an information morning at the University of Cumbria on Fusehill St., Carlisle, which we would like to invite you to. All are welcome to come along and learn more about the Syrian refugee crisis, hear about some of the needs that the families will have when they arrive and share ideas on how we can best welcome them.

### ***From the Foodbank Newsletter for Winter 2016/7***

Many thanks to all of you who work so hard to help meet the needs of local people in crisis. Thanks to your support, we have been able to feed all those who have come to us in food poverty, in addition to moving warehouse premises, carrying out very successful Tesco collections at Whitehaven and Workington, and feeding around 480 children over the Christmas holidays through our Holiday Lunchpacks scheme.

#### ***Stories from the Foodbank:***

A young mum from Maryport with 4 children who access the Kids Pack Scheme was very grateful for all the Christmas treats that were in the parcel. She hadn't been able to afford all the ingredients for a Christmas pudding and mince pies, and was delighted to find these in the parcel.

A client who was paying off a large utility bill debt was making large repayments. The floating support worker offered to help her renegotiate the debt, and she was given a foodbank voucher to support her until the repayments were reduced.

# Mining for God

For three weeks each year Keswick is filled with thousands of pilgrims attending the Keswick Convention. During these weeks, every church is full on Sundays and many people use the premises during the week. As a result, it's easy to fall into the trap of thinking everything's fine with everyone. However, some businesses are quieter at this time than in weeks running up to or after the Convention. One of these is the Slate Mine at Honister. This is the place where Tori Jones, a local preacher on trial in our Circuit, works part time. Part of her duties is to lead tours underground. Vision 21 at Keswick has challenged us about reaching out in different ways.



These two have come together in the 'Mine for God' project. Using Tori's gifts and skills, we're working with the mine to put on a mine tour with a difference. Fridays are the quiet days there so on

each of the Convention Fridays at 2pm Tori will be leading a mine tour with the help of David Hasson.

As we said, it's a mine tour with a difference! It'll contain not only information about the mine and its workers but also opportunities for singing and elements of worship.

The mine lends itself to thinking about God's creation and the environment, and people's difficult working lives.

And singing in one of the auditorium-like spaces underground with their



amazing acoustics will be an amazing experience. Where else in the world can you also experience complete darkness, and see the difference that a little light can make? How encouraging to grasp the difference our little light can make in this world as we do God's will.

We're grateful for the co-operation of the management and staff at the slate mine to enable us to plan the event. They've also provided us with these copies of some of their professional photographs (copyright belongs to the mine) which they use for marketing.

There'll be more information coming out nearer the time with costings, etc but we do know that places will be on a first come first served basis. Minimum of 15 and maximum of 40 on each tour.



Please pray that God will bless this project and the participants, and that while we work with people at the mine they'll be able to see Christ's love in us and the concern of the church for them. Please talk to friends and neighbours and encourage them to take part. The dates are Fridays, 21 and 28 July and 4 August at 2pm at Honister.
